Articles are written by Tim Martinson, Area Viticulture Specialist, and Tim Weigle, State-wide IPM Specialist, as well as by Cornell faculty and staff and other guest authors. Topics cover all aspects of grape production, including pruning and training, fertilization, pest management, farm business management, and marketing.

Each issue contains at least one in-depth article on a timely topic. Each Fall, the special 16 page Harvest Issue provides a summary of grape prices, economic outlook, and a review of the growing season and extension programs. The “Calendar of Events” provides a listing of upcoming meetings that may be of interest to grape growers.

Finger Lakes Vineyard Updates – a weekly e-mail message with timely reminders on pest management, cultural practices, weather conditions, and meeting notices. Articles are brief and focused on current vineyard tasks. Links to online resources are provided within the message. Subscribers also receive the weekly Harvest Listing of grapes for sale or wanted to purchase by buyers.
